#### What is FYCOMPA (perampanel)?

FYCOMPA is a prescription medicine used alone or with other medicines to treat partial-onset seizures with or without secondarily generalized seizures in people with epilepsy aged 4 and older and with other medicines to treat primary generalized tonic-clonic seizures in people with epilepsy aged 12 and older.

# Now that you have your prescription, what's next?

- Save on FYCOMPA® (perampanel) see if you're eligible.

#### **SELECTED SAFETY INFORMATION**

FYCOMPA may cause mental (psychiatric) problems, including: new or worse aggressive behavior (including homicidal behavior), hostility, anger, anxiety, or irritability; being suspicious or distrustful (believing things that are not true); seeing objects or hearing things that are not there; confusion; difficulty with memory; other unusual or extreme changes in behavior or mood. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have any new or worsening mental problems while taking FYCOMPA.

  - If you're on a commercial insurance plan, use the enclosed card to get your FYCOMPA for as little as \$10 a month, for savings up to \$1,300 a year. Call 1-855-347-2448 or visit fycompa.com/savings-card-program to activate your card and start saving.\*
  - If you pay cash and are eligible, you can receive up to \$60 per prescription for a maximum savings of \$720 per year.\* Ask your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure whether the offer applies to you.

3. Get your prescription filled.



Eligible patients with commercial insurance pay as little as \$10 per month for their co-pay, with a maximum savings of \$1,300 per year.

#### Take your FYCOMPA once daily at bedtime

- Your doctor may start you on FYCOMPA at a lower dose, then gradually increase your dose following a schedule. This is called titration.
- Your healthcare provider will tell you how much FYCOMPA to take and when to take it.
- Set up a routine to take your medication that works for you (for example, when you brush your teeth or get ready for bed at night)
- Keep in touch with your doctor's office if you have questions (write the contact info for your doctor's office here):

### Understand and help manage side effects

#### FYCOMPA® (perampanel) can cause side effects

- Let your doctor know if you have side effects
- Some side effects may be more frequent at higher doses and/or while your body is getting used to the medication
- If you experience a side effect, your doctor may step down your dose—or even take you off FYCOMPA
- Don't stop taking FYCOMPA on your own—you'll need to follow your doctor's instructions

#### Pay attention to your mood, especially as you're getting used to taking FYCOMPA

- It's important for your doctor to know if you have any unusual changes in behavior or mood
- Call your doctor right away if you are having mental problems, including aggressive or suicidal thoughts

#### **SELECTED SAFETY INFORMATION**

**Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take**, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Taking FYCOMPA with certain other medicines can cause side effects or reduce either drug's benefit. These medicines include: birth control, carbamazepine, phenytoin, oxcarbazepine, rifampin, and St. John's Wort.

## Get to the stable daily dose your doctor recommends

#### On your way to a stable daily dose

- You begin with "titration" (a schedule to gradually increase your dose), carefully following the directions your doctor has given you
- The dose that helps control your seizures with the fewest side effects is the dose you and your treatment team will be aiming for
  - It can be different for different people
  - You and your doctor will decide when you've reached it

#### Once you get there

Keep taking your FYCOMPA® (perampanel) as prescribed

#### Life is hectic: missed doses happen!

- If you miss a dose, don't double up: take your regular dose at bedtime the next day
- If you miss more than one dose, ask your doctor what to do next
- Taking your medicine as prescribed may reduce your risk of seizures

#### Keep in touch with your doctor's office when you need to, especially

- If you have a seizure—you may need a dose adjustment
- If you have side effects
- If you have questions

#### **SELECTED SAFETY INFORMATION**

#### What should I avoid while taking FYCOMPA?

Do not drive, operate heavy machinery, or do other dangerous activities until you know how FYCOMPA affects you. FYCOMPA may make you dizzy, sleepy, or tired. Do not drink alcohol or take other medicines that make you sleepy or dizzy until you talk to your healthcare provider. FYCOMPA taken with alcohol or medicines that cause sleepiness or dizziness may make your sleepiness or dizziness worse. FYCOMPA when taken with alcohol may also make your mood worse, increase anger, confusion, and depression.

#### **SELECTED SAFETY INFORMATION**

FYCOMPA\* (perampanel) may cause other serious side effects, including: Dizziness, vertigo (sense of spinning), and problems walking normally. You may have problems walking normally if you are unsteady because you feel dizzy. These symptoms can increase when your dose of FYCOMPA is increased. Your risk of feeling dizzy and having problems walking normally may be higher if you are elderly; Sleepiness and tiredness; Increased risk of falls. Taking FYCOMPA can increase your chance of falling. These falls can cause serious injuries. Your risk of falling may be higher if you are elderly; A serious allergic reaction that may affect your skin or other parts of your body such as your liver, kidneys, heart, or blood cells. This allergic reaction can be life-threatening and can cause death. Call your healthcare provider right away if you have: a skin rash, hives; fever or swollen glands that do not go away; swelling of your face; shortness of breath; swelling of the legs; yellowing of the skin or whites of the eyes; or dark urine.

The most common side effects of FYCOMPA\* (perampanel) include: dizziness; sleepiness; tiredness; irritability; falls; nausea and vomiting; weight gain; vertigo (sense of spinning); problems walking normally; problems with muscle coordination; headache; bruising; abdominal pain; anxiety.


